Annual Vestry Meeting February 2, 2014 Minutes

Meeting called to order at 1:04 Opened with prayers

There were 38 people present

Ven. Anne introduced new members that were in attendance and thanked everyone for submitting reports.

Vestry clerk is Ralph Mounter in his absence Cindy Caines agreed to take the minutes.

Minutes of the vestry meeting of January 27, 2013 were adopted as written. Erma made the motion, seconded by Betty McLeod.

There were no matters arising from the minutes.

Jennifer Cawley-Caruso presented a plan to host a series of evenings for families and youth on behalf of the visioning committee. They would Focus on youth mental health, addiction issues and youth sexuality. The will begin in April with the topic of mental health. Youth today experience stress and anxiety.

Motion for the adoption of all published committee reports as written was made by Jane Cox and seconded by Brent Leigh.

Cathy presented the financial statements and explained all the figures.

Motion to accept the 2014 actual and budgeted figures as presented was made by Cathy Dionne and seconded by Kath Greenidge.

Thanks was given to Cathy Dionne and Gladys Abigail for all their hard work. The counters were recognized. Having the electronic offering has made the job of the counters easier. As of January 2014 we have 27 using the electronic offering program.

Dave Fowler has agreed to review our books. Ven. Anne made the motion for Dave Fowler to take on the role of the external examiner of the books. Seconded by Bob Corrigan. Vote – all in favour.

Thanks was given to the nominating committee. There is no change in wardens. Erma Howe and Anne Trimmer both serving their 2nd year of a 5 year term.

Names of last year's youth synod delegates were read and we are hoping Heather Ames will attend this year.

Everyone was invited to attend the board meetings that usually last two hours.

Opportunity was given to everyone to sit on the board. Jennifer Ames was nominated by Erma Howe and seconded by Jane Cox.

Kath Greenidge mentioned we do need help with our website and we may need to look at getting a newer updated website. Currently our website manager is not answering calls or emails and we do pay over \$400 a year for this service.

Added Jane Cox as Green team leader to the list of other positions that do not require attendance at the meetings.

Thanks was given to each board member. It should be noted, we are a working board.

Eucharistic Assistants- added Thelma Smith to the list.

Beaumont Nelson nominated Brent Leigh as Eucharistic Assistant and Brent accepted.

Storage project presented by Bob Corrigan

The cold storage area located behind the Sanctuary is pulling away from the wall. We have discussed the possibility of connecting the storage room off of the fellowship room with the 'cold storage' area having it heated and all at one level. This was presented to representatives of all the church groups and the board. All were in favour and liked the plan presented.

Bob explained the drawings and asked for suggestions.

- we will gain 60% more storage area. Each group will have their own area. There will be a closet for all the gowns that are currently stored in the upstairs room and hall closet going into the fellowship hall

- costed new vinyl siding
- want to start the project in May
- bricklayer can do both in May
- tear down cold storage will be led by Harley, who has youth to help
- will rent a bin to store everything until the job is done
- we will utilize most of what is in the storage areas and use for new area.
- Wayne Bonas will take over at the framing stage
- David and Rob Caines worked on the heating system, cost \$700

This will be completed following the guidelines of our green audit.

Total cost \$14,000 which includes 15% contingency

Brick on the front of the church would cost \$7000 to replace and this has already been approved. A sample photo of the brick selected was passed around.

There were no questions.

Bob Corrigan made the motion to approve the construction of the storage area for the coming year 2014, as presented. Seconded by Brent Leigh Vote - all in favour.

Ven. Anne discussed her concern of using all the funds and leaving us low in funds if something unexpected was to happen. We could apply for a loan from the Archbishop Wright Building Fund (through the Diocese). We have a good credit rating with the Diocese. There is paperwork that would need to be completed as soon as possible.

Gary spoke and shared his thoughts. We have a plan A or plan B, do we appeal to our congregation?

There was a discussion regarding any other concerns with our building. Harley explained the only item would be a water leak and the need to caulk the J trim, which is not a big job. Cathy Dionne indicated we do not pay for the loan until we use it and suggested we apply for the loan and repay it as quickly as possible. We will fundraise within our church community and everyone will be invited to contribute.

Bob mentioned Del needs help with the work he does. Del shared that he no longer gets help from the John Howard Society. He needs help taking everything apart. People can bring in any metal, copper, brass, taps, sinks, plumbing, barbecues, air conditioners, electrical wire, cable and pop cans.

You can drop these items off at Dels's home, 465 Westmount Ave. It was also mentioned that we can give high school student volunteer hours to help.

Anne Trimmer made the motion to borrow \$10, 000 from the Bishop Wright Memorial Building Fund.

Brent Leigh made the motion to amend the amount to \$14,000 and for it to be paid back as quickly as possible. Seconded by Marlene Moulton Vote all in favour

Our Christmas Outreach Funds

How do we spend it? Suggestions were given: Samaritan Centre- Coldest night of the year walk, Jacqueline Villeneuve Orphanage, Hospice.

Cathy Dionne made a motion we give \$500 to the Jacqueline Villeneuve orphanage. Second-

ed by Erma Howe.

Betty McLeod made a motion we give \$500 to the Hospice. Cathy Dionne made a motion we give \$300 to the Samaritan Centre. Gary made a motion we amend the amount to \$500 to the Samaritan Centre.

The motions were seconded by Betty Bonas. Vote all in favour.

2014 is our 60th anniversary, our jubilee year and we should celebrate!

Cindy shared she will be starting up a men's club. Gary gave thanks for the warm welcome.

Ven Anne spoke about our outreach with Barrydowne College and shared a conversation she had with another church who knew us and the wonderful outreach we have with our neighbours.

We closed the meeting in prayer. Meeting adjourned

Dear friends in Christ,

It gives me great pleasure to present my report for 2014 – my fourteenth as your rector. Now where did those years disappear to?! I can honestly say that there has not been one ordinary year at the Ascension since I became your rector in 2000 – every year has been an extraordinary one. It's not surprising really because I am blessed with an extraordinary congregation who go out of their way to do extraordinary things for their love of God and the Church.

As you peruse the pages of the Vestry booklet, you will see that this is true. You will read of people giving their time, talents, and treasures to help others grow in their faith as they shared in ministry at the Ascension.

If there is a word that captured last year for me, it would be 'Thanksgiving' -:

Thanksgiving for the joy I experience every time I walk through the doors of the church.

Thanksgiving for the dedication and commitment of the wardens, board members, honouraries, and other parish leaders.

Thanksgiving for each person who calls the Ascension their spiritual home, and for their participation in the life of our congregation.

Thanksgiving for those who make it possible for someone else to attend church by offering them a ride to church.

Thanksgiving for the way in which we helped to build the new storage unit – both through the work of our hands and the generosity of many who offered their time and money to make it possible.

Thanksgiving for the way in which members of the former "St. Mark's" congregation were welcomed into the Ascension, and for the way in which they became part of our life together.

Thanksgiving for 'Godly Play' and 'Messy Church', and for how important we see the spiritual formation of our children.

Thanksgiving for the way we reached out to the sick, bereaved, seniors and shut ins in our congregation so they did not feel forgotten when they were absent on Sundays.

Thanksgiving for the compassionate way we reached out beyond our doors to those who are in need.

Thanksgiving for our good relationships with our neighbouring churches.

60th Anniversary Celebrations

What made last year different, and extra special, was that it was the 60th Anniversary of our life together as a faith community. The Ascension began in a New Sudbury school room, as 29 people met for worship on the 25th January 1954 all because they wanted to be a faith community in our area. They then met regularly for worship and to discuss the possibility of building their own church. Within four short years a church was built on Sparks Street and the vital vibrant congregation we are today, with more than 300 individuals and families on our parish list is a result of the faithfulness of clergy and laity for 60 years.

Last year was an opportunity to reflect on the past, celebrate the present and look forward to a hopeful future. And celebrate we did! From a neighbourhood BBQ lunch in the parking lot, to a children's party, to an evening of dining and dancing, culminating in a Service of Thanksgiving, it was a year to remember.

Although Bishop Stephen and Fawna were not able to join us for the Service of Thanksgiving, due to family circumstances, and were missed, we will look forward to their visit this year.

One of the most meaningful ways that we celebrated our 60th Anniversary was through a 'thank offering', the proceeds of which we directed to the Diocese of Tarime in Tanzania. It was our hope that the funds be used for a parish to take their first steps to their 60th Anniversary. It was wonderful to receive a letter of thanks for that gift from both Bishop Mwita and Bishop Stephen. The funds will go to the Rebu Church which has so far been built by funds solely raised by the congregation has one wall to complete before it will be ready for its roof. (the roof will be funded by monies raised by the Bishop).

In his letter to us, Bishop Mwita says that a completed church building with a roof will keep out the rain and the heat during worship, but that the church itself will used for much more than just worship. Churches in Tanzania are also community centres of education during the week. Water, that very basic commodity, is harvested into huge barrels for drinking.

In his letter, Bishop Stephen writes – "I remember seeing the foundation of the Rebu Church and I recall the aspirations of many in the diocese that the church would be a centre of education for young girls. When we were there we heard how many young women from rural areas, upon completion of their elementary education at age 14 are unable to proceed to further education. The majority of these girls end up in early marriages where they acquiesce to a gender inequality that is degrading. The establishment of churches not only provides a place for Christians to worship, but a community institution rooted in gospel values that seek the betterment of all."

A tiny gift of money from Sudbury has the potential to transform lives in a very practical way.

A Spirit Filled Church

As I was tidying up emails files recently I came across one entitled "A Spirit Filled Church". It was the recording of a message I received on the answering machine from Elizabeth Gates, shortly before she died. Elizabeth was one of our founding members, and wife to Del. She spent the last years of her life in a nursing home, but she continued to be a vital member of our congregation as she prayed for people, and shared her wit and wisdom when they visited her. Elizabeth's message started out with her reading a passage from the Book of Acts –

"Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had things in common. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home, and ate their food with glad and generous hearts. And day by day the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved." Acts 2. 43-47

Elizabeth then went on to read a passage from a devotional book she kept beside her. She read, "A Spirit filled church is a going to be a supernatural church. By supernatural I mean that there will be things about the people in the church that can't be explained in human terms. If people don't see the transformation of others they will have no reason to listen to

what is being preached. When the church shows itself to be a place of power, lives are being transformed, and the only legitimate explanation is that God is doing something."

Elizabeth ended her message by saying she believed that this was a description of the Church of the Ascension, and that she was blessed to be a part of that church.

I agree with Elizabeth on all counts, including that I am blessed to be part of this congregation. What I have witnessed over the last several years is that God is doing something wonderful in our midst. Lives are being transformed, and being made into the image and likeness of God as people are taking their baptismal call seriously.

I will be bold enough to say that the real test of our success here is not what we have done, and all that we have achieved, but how we have done it. For the real measure of our extraordinariness as Christians is not our thoughtfulness, or our friendliness, or our busyness – but only how the gifts of the Holy Spirit flow from us and how the Holy Spirit's fruits of love, joy, peace patience, kindness, goodness and self control are evident in and through us.

The real sign of our witness as Christ's disciples is not how much we have accomplished but our own lightness and our own reflection of the bright God who has chosen us and lit us up and sent us into the world like candles in a dark room.

A Hopeful future

At the January Board meeting the members of the board took another look at the Assessment summary that the Diocesan Congregational Development Officer Jay Koyle prepared for us, and which we received last year. You will recall that we did the Assessment in 2013. Jay made the following suggestions as to some possible actions we might take in the future.

Strengthen and increase ecumenical and community partnerships

Use flexible space to strengthen formation and mission – employ configurations that incorporate greater bodily movement as well as reflect and reinforce the character, values, and mission of the congregation

Foster small group ministry and shape channels for incorporating inquirers into the way of discipleship and the life of the faith community

Expand notions of hospitality beyond offering a welcome on Sundays and providing a friendly atmosphere – consider the place of mutuality and of embracing the stranger as integral to biblical notions of hospitality

Work toward adding additional paid pastoral/missional staff.

I am pleased to say that in the past couple of years we have strengthened our ecumenical and community partnerships and have a vital ministerial with our neighbouring churches, as well as a terrific partnership with Barrydowne College. It was exciting to see the small group ministry taking shape as we met to read and discuss Bonhoeffer's "Life Together" with Father Bob.

In addition to these, we have also seen a greater focus on our young families and children's ministry. This is due in no small work to the dedication of our Child and Youth Ministry team.

I was also delighted to see how many people came forward to offer their help with the various property jobs that are handled on a weekly basis at the Ascension, and which deputy warden Harley Moulton had mostly taken care of. They say that 'many hands make light work'- so true.

An extension of your ministry

You know that as the Archdeacon I have additional responsibilities in our deanery and diocese. It is a privilege for me to be of assistance to Bishop Stephen as I visit other congregations in Sudbury/Manitoulin and render assistance as needed. 2014 was a very busy year in that respect as St. James Church went up for sale, as well as St. Mark's in Garson. The people of St. James moved to a new location in the South Ridge Mall, and the people of St. Mark's have joined other congregations. It is always sad to see a church building close, but we give thanks for the years of ministry that happened in both of those places and believe that God will continue to bless those who once worshipped in them.

In 2014 I visited St. Christopher's Church in Mac Gregor Bay during the summer, getting a good taste of life in a summer parish. In the fall I visited St. Thomas' on the French River.

I also serve as the Chaplain for the Greater Sudbury Police Services and I am often present at ceremonial functions or for a chat and coffee as needed by the sworn or civilian staff.

Sometimes both of these duties and responsibilities take me away from the parish. These are part of my calling to the wider church, and are important. In many ways I see these ministries as an extension of we who are at the Ascension – a compassionate people who see beyond our own needs, and who offer ourselves to others.

Thank you for supporting me in these ministries, and for all the ways in which you extend the hand of friendship to Colin, Caitlin and Richard. We are so grateful to be part of the Ascension family.

Dear Ascension Friends, brothers and sisters in Christ:

It is hard to believe that another year has passed and the "Vestry Season" is upon us again! (I always have thought that the Church calendar goes as follows: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany and Vestry!)

Pastoral Care

Pastoral visitations remain an integral part of life at the Ascension and they are made possible by a committed group of parishioners who visit those who live in nursing or retirement homes, or who are simply too frail to join us regularly for worship or other parish activities. Their visits are a blessing to these once active members of the congregation who feel connected with us through these visits. Prayers are always offered during these visits, and sometimes communion is given through the reserved sacrament. Often visitors bring homemade cookies, a magazine, or a card – and these small tokens of friendship are also greatly appreciated.

There are also many parishioners who are friends with those who don't make it to church regularly, or who are bereaved – and their calls, cards, prayers, emails and visits are also appreciated.

Each pastoral visitor follows the Screening in Faith guidelines as set out by the diocese and is asked to obtain a police record check before taking on this ministry.

In addition to visits, care and concern for seniors and shut ins happens through our weekly intercessions; as the weekly bulletin and announcements are mailed to each person to ensure they are kept updated on what is happening in the parish (thank you Thelma), through the delivery of a plant and homemade cookies at Christmas and Easter to each of our seniors, along with a note of greeting. Thank you to the Outreach team and Parish Life for organising these and to parishioners for your generous donation of cookies and treats.

Another important part of pastoral care and concern are the weekly and monthly worship services in neighbourhood retirement residences and nursing homes. Every Thursday morning for the last 25 years a team of volunteers assists with the service at Falconbridge Extendicare. Parishioners like Betty Bonas, Irene Ginson Fiss, Marlene Giblin, Daryl Keen, Marjorie Morton, and Thelma Smith faithfully ensured that residents were brought to the recreation room for a service. Due to the frailty of many residents, and the difficulty in finding volunteers to continue with this in an ongoing way, the volunteers ended this ministry in 2014.

The monthly services at the Westmount Residence continue. Worship leaders for these services are Rev. Anne, Rev. Stewart Walker from St. Stephen's on the Hill, and Rev. Erin Todd from Trinity United Church. There is a growing number of parishioners at the Westmount, and we look forward to continuing these services in 2015. We are thankful to Marjorie Morton for offering her gift of music, to Roz Jones, Betty Bonas, Thelma Smith, and Hazel Edwards for their presence and participation.

We are also very grateful to Rev. Rhonda, the Chaplain at Health Sciences North for the loving care she provides to so many parishioners who are hospitalized. She often drops by to visit, pray with, anoint, and offer wise counsel to family members as parishioners recover.

Visitations remain key to Rev. Anne's ministry and she brings communion to shut ins, and makes regular home and hospital visits to our seniors and the sick throughout the year. Her office door is always open for a visit and a time of prayer for anyone in need.

Outreach

Outreach at the Church of the Ascension is continually ongoing with many areas of dedicated parishioners working for many great and needy causes. I am always amazed at how many work towards trying to make life a little better for those not quite as fortunate as others.

As you know, one of our large contributions goes to the Elgin Street Mission in assisting them to remain open and assist in feeding the many guests who go through their facility daily. We provide them with a sum of money to get them started in the fall as well as amounts of food throughout the winter months such as veggies and ground beef. Our parishioners are still providing 35 to 40 loaves of sandwich bread and fixings to be served for lunches once a month. This is known as Sandwich Sunday in our church and occurs on the second Sunday of the month.

Our parish has once again participated in the Shoeboxes at Christmas for Operation Christmas Child. You have all been most generous.

We continue to support families in need, both in our parish and in the neighbourhood. We are grateful to be able to assist these families with food from our food bank and with food cards for grocery stores. At Christmas we were able to pack and deliver Christmas hampers to nine families. These baskets consist of a full Christmas dinner as well as numerous boxes of food for weeks later. After Christmas we were able to deliver a very large supply of food to the students at Cambrian College. They have a food bank that enables some of the students in need to use these supplies.

We have been a tremendous help and support to the students at Barrydowne College. We continually supply numerous boxes of food to the students on an ongoing process. We also send containers of clothing along with kitchen supplies for students trying to set up an apartment. At Christmas we provided 25 Christmas stockings for the students. We provide pizza days at the school and provided a hot lunch for the students here in our church. We have provided a large sum of money to help them with special events and also contributed to awards at their graduation at the end of June. (Please see Marie Vi-

tone's comments on Barrydowne). Marie is a great asset to us and to the students in seeing that the needs of the college are met. Thank you Marie.

We are still a part of the Out of the Cold Program, which provides a hot meal on Friday evenings from the beginning of November to the end of April. We cater to four dinners over the season, and have a new team for the Out of the Cold Dinners. Stephanie Doveton and Matt Walchuk have taken on this

role and are doing a wonderful job. They have experimented with new ideas and new menus, and have been greatly successful. We thank all the parishioners who go out to help and contribute in so many ways to providing a healthy and joyful evening for those desperately in need.

Our outreach funds during the year 2014 enabled us to donate money to some different organizations. We were able to send a donation to the Zawadi Children's Home in Africa. This is an organization that was founded and is being looked after by a young woman from the Sudbury area. This young woman came to our church and spoke to us about the need for this worthwhile venture. Another donation was made to the Primate's World Relief Fund through the Anglican Church for the program "Have You Eaten Today?". We were also able to send a donation to the Maison Vale Inco Hospice to assist them in their continuing palliative care program.

This year was the 60th Anniversary of our church. In celebration of this anniversary, we made a thank offering to a new and growing church in the Diocese of Tarime, Tanzania. Through this offering we were able to send a gift of \$ 1,600 to Tarime.

In November we were especially pleased to have a missionary, Mary Sherwood, visit us and bring us her news of the orphanages in Madagascar. Mary has been involved in these orphanages for many years. The open offering in church that morning was presented to Mary for the continued work in Madagascar. We were able to give her \$ 900 from our parish. Thank you all for your generosity.

Our ACW continued to make Friendship Quilts during 2014. We have a new supply of quilts to go out to a needy organization. The ACW is still collecting money for the Sleeping Children Around the World. This project supplies bedrolls, clothing, and hygiene products for children in Third World countries.

Thank you to all the parishioners here at the Ascension for all the donations of food, grocery cards, and money to the Anne Germond Fund that enable us to carry out all of the above. A special thank you to Rev. Anne for overseeing all that we do and for her contributions through the Anne Germond Fund. I sincerely thank you for all that you have done. We are certainly a very loving, caring and considerate parish.

Green Team

On June 6th, 2014 Reverend Anne, Kath Greenidge and Jane Cox participated in a webinar for any interested individuals and/ churches. The purpose of the webinar was to share our church's experience with a Green Audit and encourage others to go down a similar path. We discussed protecting God's creation, Climate Change and justice issues. Clearly these all align with the Anglican Church's 5th Mark of Mission. Through power point slides, with pictures and captions, many small and a couple of large projects were shared.

The focus of the Ascension's Earth Day in April was on celebrating the long time work of Del Gates, who sells scrap metal recovered from appliances. This raised awareness within the congregation resulting in a renewed interest in bringing in used appliances. Multiple thousands of dollars has been given to the parish by Del over the years through his tireless and dedicated commitment to recycling also includes pop cans. The funds raised are designated to what is called 'Special Projects'! Del contributed over \$6000 from scrap metal in 2014. Shocking and great!

In the same way beer cans and liquor bottles continue to be dropped off by parishioners as even the 'nickels and dimes' that are collected, though small they may seem, (just under \$300.00 in 2014) do add up to growth in our church's wellbeing and contribute to the bigger picture of 'Greening our Sacred Space'.

A community garden at Twin Forks Park was born in 2014! Some physical labour and a donation from the Rev. Anne Germond Fund will help really launch the garden in 2015.

In September 2014, the Parish Life Committee decluttered the church's cleaning/ janitorial cupboard. After reviewing the report from a working group on cleaning from St. James Anglican Church in Niagara, nontoxic cleaning products have replaced all toxic products.

A Green Open House event was held on Oct 8th, 2014. Slides from the June Green Audit webinar, were shared in the church. Educational handouts were given to participants. Our 'tour guide' Harley Moulton, showcased many greening changes inside and outside of the church – some as a result of the 2013 Green Audit. These ran from small tasks such as caulking around the fan in the fellowship room, to large projects in the re bricking of the front of the church, changes in landscaping and the building of a new storage unit. For a list of specific changes to the building and environs and their costs, please consult Harley Moulton or Jane Cox for a written report. 'Green, locally sourced' snacks fuelled our tourists post tour. Recipes and a display of homemade Green Cleaning Products were on hand. The evening ended with a climate change educational piece, facilitated by Scribe Erica Bota.

Worship

Sunday after Sunday throughout the year the Ascension is a lively place of worship. Young and old, newcomers and strangers all gather to give glory to God in our beautiful sanctuary. It is indeed a safe place for people to sing, pray, give thanks, laugh, share com-

munion, and even shed a few tears. We are fortunate to be able to offer two services of worship on a Sunday at 9am and 11am. Usually we use the rite in the Book of Alternative Services, but it was decided that if there is a fifth Sunday in the month, that we will use the worship rite from the Book of Common Prayer.

It is said that liturgy is the 'work of the people' and this is true at the Church of the Ascension. We have very active participation in our services through our laity those who prepare the bulletins, prepare the altar for worship, read the Scriptures, lead the Prayers of the People, sing in the choir, lead contemporary music, serve as Eucharistic assistants, servers, crucifers, and as Lay Readers. Philip Balson continues to play the organ/ piano at the 11am service, while Eleanor Connors joins us twice monthly at the 9am service. EK, our contemporary music group offers their music ministry once a month. During these services the service is projected on the screen, and this makes it so much

easier to follow along. Jeremy Mannella and Matt Walchuk enriched our services by canting the Psalm.

In 2014 we welcomed a number of families and individuals from St. Mark's Church in Garson after they made the decision as a congregation to close their church building. Within a short time they felt right at home in our midst and are involved in the life of the parish. We will be receiving a number of memorials from St. Mark's Garson which will find a special place at the Ascension. These include a stained glass window, a couple of wall hangings, a fret work of The Lord's Prayer, and a Christus Rex.

We love children in church and we are encouraged when we see young families arriving with children and other young people in their lives. Thank you to parents and grandparents for supporting your young people in their faith journey. Children enrich our lives and our worship. In 2014 we trained some new servers – Joshua Campbell and Jayna Martin; while Maggie Leigh and William Filliter joined the Sunday morning readers group.

Other new servers and crucifers included Kath Greenidge, Cathy Jewell, Bruce Heuft, while Catherine Bird-Heuft was installed as a lay reader. She joins Erma Howe, Dave Fowler and Shannon Hengen as faithful layreaders in the parish. Brent Leigh, Connie Lee and Cathy Jewell became Eucharistic assistants.

Guests to the Ascension or regular attendees receive a warm welcome from greeters and sidespeople, as well as those they sit next to in church. Thank you one and all for your vital, faithful ministry during worship services, and to the congregation for their active, engaged participation.

Wednesday morning services of worship continue to be important in our community. Throughout the year a group of 10– 18 people gather to pray for the world, those in need, and each other, share communion, and reflect on the Word. In place of a homily there is often a time for people to share stories of faith. Following this service there is a time of fellowship, followed by the weekly Bible Study. Once again, we used the series Feasting on the Word, which is engaging, relevant to our daily lives and challenging to our faith.

Last year Fr. Bob Derrenbacker and the Rev. Rhonda Hirst continued in their role as our Honourary Associate and Assistant. They are frequent celebrants at the Eucharist on Sunday mornings, preach occasionally throughout the year, and they are always available for pastoral emergencies or when Rev. Anne is away. We are thankful for the ministry they offer to us at the Ascension, as each of them have their own full time jobs.

In the fall of 2014, as part of our 60th anniversary celebrations, Fr. Bob lead a four week book study on Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book, "Life Together". We met in various parishioners homes on a Sunday evening and it was an excellent study and good to see different members of our congregation participating, as well as members of other congregations and denominations. Both Fr. Bob and Rev. Rhonda have offered themselves to other congregations in the deanery as the need arises.

A prayer service was held for the Week of Christian Unity at Trinity United Church in Garson on January 19th. We shared the Ash Wednesday liturgy with our friends from St. Stephen's on Wednesday 5th March. Our Holy Week services were shared with St. Stephen's on the Hill, and the dramatic presentation on Good Friday was a truly memorable one.

Once Easter was over, the Ministerial group started preparing in earnest for the ELE-VATE weekend of service, fellowship, and prayer. More than 50 churches across Greater Sudbury were involved in the ELE- VATE weekend to show our unity in the Holy Spirit. The idea was for each ministerial group to prepare an outreach project in their local community and then for us all to share in a service for Christians across Sudbury on Pentecost Sunday (June 6th).

ELEVATE was a wonderful opportunity for our congregations to get to know each other as we worked together on a service project in the community. Our ministerial group decided to prepare a soup and sandwich lunch for anyone in the neighbourhood. We had a lot of fun working on it and prepared enough soup for 100 people. When the day of the soup making and serving arrived we were ready to greet the crowds as they entered St. Andrew the Apostle on Barrydowne Rd. Unfortunately, we planned the lunch during the winter months when it was freezing...and June 5th was a hot, hot day. No one felt like eating soup! We stood on the sidewalk and held posters inviting people in, but in the end we sent most of the soup to the Mission. It remained an excellent day!

Throughout 2014 we continued to provide health lunches to the students at Barrydowne College – a high school that is housed in Cambrian College. Each month during the school year a different congregation prepared a delicious lunch for the students. These lunches were very well received and included sandwiches, juice, snacks and treats.

The North Eastern Ministerial members were invited to the Barrydowne College graduation ceremony in June. It was very special to see the joy and excitement in the faces of the students as they walked across the stage to receive their High School Diplomas. This year the Ascension – through the ACW, the Rev. Anne Germond Fund, and to honour Del and Elizabeth Gates, gave several bursaries to the students. Members of the Ascension congregation were on hand to present the awards.

During Advent, along with St. John's in Garson, and St. Stephen's on the Hill we participated in filling Christmas stockings with treats for 75 students at Barrydowne College, and on the 22nd December we were invited to share in "The Longest Night Service" at St. Stephen's. This is a prayer service for those who find the Christmas season difficult.

We give thanks for our good relationships with our friends in other denominations and look forward to what 2015 will bring us. At the time of writing we are planning our Service of Christian Unity for January 25th, 2015. There will be more than 10 local congregations joining us for this service of worship!

Messy Church Worship

'Messy worship' is different from the very structured liturgy to which we are accustomed. It is less formal and the clergy do not wear vestments. Messy worship is theme based and the readings and songs chosen for the day are relevant to the Messy Church theme. During 2014 we learned a great deal by participating in a Messy "Passover" celebration during Lent. The hall was filled with participants and it was a joyful time of learning, and celebrating that ancient feast. In Advent we started monthly Messy Church evenings with a Messy Advent. During the worship/story time Kath Greenidge and Cathy Jewell did a great skit on a conversation between John the Baptist and Santa Claus. These monthly Messy Church events will continue through 2015.

Spiritual Direction

A little known activity takes place at the Ascension in the Chapel on a monthly basis. Two Spiritual Directors – Eva Black from North Bay, and Shannon Hengen from the Ascension meet with directees to talk about their spiritual lives and to grow in their faith. Of the Chapel space, Eva Black says, "I am so thankful for that little chapel. What a sacred space it is! Always I sense the Holy Spirit with me when I am there."

These words sum up worship at the Ascension. It is a special, sacred time, and we always sense the Holy Spirit in our midst.

The Committee was less active this year as attention in the parish moved to 60th Anni-versary planning.

Two presentations were held to provide a safe space for youth and their families to be informed and have discussions. The topics chosen reflected issues that youth and families in this parish are experiencing.

In May, Kevin McPhee, a family psychotherapist and social worker from Health Sciences North, presented on the topic of Anxiety and Depression, identifying symptoms and providing information on how to help our youth. The event was well attended. The information was relevant, important and well received. What was emphasized was how our relationships, sincere listening and participating in the lives of our youth, decrease mental health risks that they face.

In June, Gaston Cotnoir, from Access Network gave us a talk on Sexual Diversity, providing language, information and understanding of sexual expression and orientation. Participants were led in a frank discussion to help us shed biases and think inclusively.

In 2015, we hope to continue the series with a talk on Addiction and Cyberbullying.
