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From the Rector...

Dear Ascension friends,

The colour blue will welcome you when you arrive at church during the Advent season which begins on November 27th and ends on Christmas Eve. Look out for the beautiful hangings on the wall and in front of the altar, pulpit and lectern. Blue is the colour of hope and expectation; the colour of longing. We wait for the advent of the One who came to be with us – Emmanuel.

The season of Advent calls us to do something that might be difficult in today's frenetic world. Anne Thurston in her book, "A Time of Waiting: Images and Insights" says that Advent pulls us 'against the grain of commerce and offers time as a dimension of depth and stillness rather than the clock and calendar." (Thurston, pg.24)

Advent calls us to slow down in a world that affirms busyness.

It calls us to be patient in a world and a time that demands immediate answers.

It calls us to wait in a world that never pauses for breath.

It calls us to be silent in a noisy world.

It calls us to sit in the darkness as we wait for the Light to dawn.

Stillness. Patience. Silence. Darkness. Waiting.

These are not easy for things for us to be or do when everything around us is sending a different message.

But what it we did choose to use the Advent season to step away from the hustle and bustle of the pre-Christmas season and chose to live into one of those words each week? What if we took a period of time every day and sat quietly and prayed, meditated, contemplated a passage from the Scriptures? What if we stayed with that difficult person and demonstrated the kind of patience that allows a new relationship to blossom and reconciliation to take place? What if we brought the thing we are most afraid of – the darkness that holds us in its grip, before the throne of God and asked for light to shine on it?

I'll bet that if we could practice stillness, patience, silence and waiting in darkness and allow them to penetrate our being this Advent, that the grace of God grace will find us and fill our lives with Advent HOPE and turn it into Christmas JOY.

I pray that this will also be a time of looking ahead with hope and expectation to the New Year and all that God has in store for you at the Ascension. 2017 will be a year of change with my departure from the parish after sixteen years of being your rector. Because I know you well, I have confidence that you will work together to make the interim period a time that reflects our mission and commitment to Christ and what it means to be the Church in this time. As Christians we believe that God is already at work in ways that we cannot even imagine, and so we can look forward to something new and exciting. Know that you are in my prayers as you enter this new time in the life of the parish.

I give thanks for the leadership of the wardens, honourary clergy, and board members who are already hard at work putting plans into place to ensure a smooth transition in February. You can read all about those plans in this copy of the Ascension Witness.

From the Wardens...

We have been busy this month beginning the process of transition. We hope to maintain good contact and communication with everyone through this time. We appreciate the many questions expressed by individuals and encourage you to keep asking and sharing any concerns or curiosities. I will endeavour to summarize some of the areas that people are asking about:

The Concurrence Committee:

This committee will be formed following the departure of Rev. Anne. It is made up of 4-6 parishioners. They are elected by parishioners at a Special Vestry. The task of the Concurrence Committee is to create a "parish profile," which is a detailed document of who we are as the parish of the Ascension and a view of where we want to journey as a community of faith.

Often, a parish takes on much of the personality, identity and attributes of its priest. Once Anne leaves, the pause before looking for another priest will allow us to see who the parish of the Ascension is, and what the parish feels called to be. In this regard, at our last Board meeting, the general recommendation is that the contemplative period of Lent, which shortly follows Anne's departure, will provide space and opportunities for such meaningful reflections and conversations.

An appropriate time for the special vestry to elect the concurrence committee would be approximately in May. The committee completes its profile which is a task that tends to take 3 to 4 months. The profile is given to the Bishop who then makes a recommendation of a candidate or candidates to be interviewed. This is a strictly confidential process. The concurrence committee gives its recommendation back to the Bishop, and the Bishop appoints the new incumbent.

We are encouraging any parishioner who feel called to be on the concurrence committee to let the wardens know. We will compile a list of interested individuals and hope to present this at our Annual vestry in January.

Finances

We recognize that there is heightened anxiety that comes with change and that fear can appear in concern for the parish's financial health. Thank you so much for the generous donations of this past year. Finances tend to be an uncomfortable issue to discuss but one that is a reality for all of us. As Brent wrote in last month's warden report, we are asking parishioners to consider an Offering in Thanksgiving to the parish as a way to express personal gratitude. Also, as you consider your financial contribution in the year to come, you may find your present situation allows you to make a modest increase to your regular contributions. Again, we appreciate your giving, support and consideration.

Annual Vestry

We have our regular yearly vestry meeting on January 22. Please consider attending. For those who need to submit an annual report, the deadline is January 5.

Pastoral Care and Worship

We are already preparing a roster for our services from February through to June. I am amazed to see that it is almost filled!!! Our honourary assistants and worship leaders are signing up and we will likely maintain Eucharist on Sunday services, and Morning Prayer on Wednesdays and alternate Fridays and alternate Sunday Evening Prayer. Thank you so much worship leaders!

We are blessed to have a pastoral team and we are hoping to build this roster. Please contact me if you are interested in this special ministry. Also, please speak to us of your spiritual care needs so that you are not missed or neglected. Every parishioner is important to us and we don't want anyone to be left out. If you or someone near you has pastoral needs, please let a warden know. We are blessed with pastoral leaders who can take time to listen and pray with you.

Our Farewell

Jennifer Ames is organizing transportation to Anne's consecration on February 11 in Sault Ste Marie. We are chartering a bus at the cost of \$45/person. The bus will leave at noon on Friday February 10 from the Ascension with an additional pick up in the south end. The bus will head back to Sudbury after the reception on Saturday. If you are interested in traveling on the bus, please contact Jen. For accommodation, please contact the Days Inn directly. 25 rooms have been set aside at the price of \$85.

Jen is also leading a small committee to organize our celebratory events. Please mark your calendar for January 29 when there will be a reception for Anne (details to be announced).

Also, the Ascension will be giving Anne a gift: a beautiful mitre which Anne has selected. Collection arrangements will be announced.

There has been concern expressed about the expense of the vestments that the Bishop will need. The Diocese has a special purse so that Anne does not incur the expenses. Parishes and individuals across the Diocese will be donating to this.

Property update

The Whole Nine Yards has been awarded the tender to care for our snow plowing and removal needs. Thank you, Chantal Rozon, for all your work in this process.

Thank you to Ralph and Philip for the stained glass installation and lighting. It is beautiful. Also, thank you to the Iburg family. The stained glass will be rededicated soon.

Winter habits: Please ensure that blinds are drawn to 6 inches from the bottom of the window, when you have finished using the fellowship hall or board room. This helps with heating efficiency. Also please make sure all the doors leading to the Church are closed as there is a heating differential in that space from the rest of the building. The board room door needs to be kept closed as well. Thank you.

Thank you to those who grab a shovel to clear our front and side walkway and/or sprinkle salt/salt. Please remember to record the work and time on a Maintenance Form (they hang next to the freezer in the furnace room), to show due diligence on our part.

Garbage: The City has recently enforced our designation as a commercial

building and has thus refused to pick up our garbage in its residential pick up. The wardens are sorting out this issue. In the meantime, we ask if a few parishioners each week wouldn't mind taking a bag or blue box to add to their collection. Thank you.

We so appreciate all the love, help, and support that happens in our community. The Ascension is truly a place where we feel Christ's presence in our midst. Christ lives in the smiles, the loving acts, the hugs, and warmth that each of you offer.

In the parish...

The following document on Memorials at the Church of the Ascension will be brought to the floor of the Annual Vestry meeting on January 22nd 2017 for discussion and approval. With the congregation's approval this document will become the Ascension's policy on Memorial donations and gifts.

Church of the Ascension Memorials

Memorial gifts are often given at the time of a person's death in lieu of flowers. It is a way to say that the person was important, and it gives the family and their friends the opportunity to honour that person's life. Memorial gifts do not always have to come when a person dies. Some may be given on the anniversary of a death, or at other times in the year.

At the Church of the Ascension there are a number of avenues for memorial gifts to be made.

- 1) To the '**Memorial Fund'** (the bank account is held at RBC). Traditionally the funds are used for items for the altar such as holy hardware, banners, altar linen, communion sets, or gowns.
- 2) Funds can be given to the **'Special Project Fund' (RBC Bank account)** which can be used for any special project eg. A special building project or another project which the parish considers worthwhile.
- In recent years families have also requested that memorial donations be made to the Rev. Anne Germond Fund (Rector's discretionary fund used for outreach purposes held at RBC).
- 4) Memorials may also be made to the **General Operating Fund**, the Outreach Fund, or to the Building Fund (Funds held in CIBC).
- 2) Procedure for Memorial donations.
 - a) Families may or may not consult the parish following the death of a loved one in selecting which avenue they wish the memorial funds to be directions. Once the family has decided on the avenue, donations are made through the funeral home or through the weekly offering.
 - b) The offering Counters ensure that the donations are deposited into the correct place (Memorial, Special Project, Rev. Anne Germond, Operating, or Building)
 - c) The Envelope Secretary keeps track of donations given in memory of a particular person and ensures that the parish treasurer is aware of this. The Envelope Secretary ensures that tax receipts are issued to the donors and that the family of the deceased is made aware of the donations so that they can send out thank you cards. A memorial record is kept so that regular reports can be given to the Rector and Memorial Committee members, and an annual report made at the Vestry meeting. **Action – Ascension Memorial Card?**
 - d) The Rector of the parish or a member of the Memorial Committee communicates with the family of the deceased to notify them of the amount that has been given and to begin a dis-

cussion about what is to become of the money.

- e) The leaders of the church should decide the purpose for which gifts may be used, and maintain a list of desired gifts. The leadership should be aware of the various memorial avenues available to families. They should include gifts that are costly as well as gifts of lesser amounts. Each group within the parish should be encouraged to prepare a 'wish list' for their particular group. Eg. The Sunday school might need items for Godly Play, the nursery or the parish youth, and the property committee might have suggestions for up-grades to the building (including regular upkeep) that should be included. Church leaders should also include program gifts such as purchasing a Bible Study program, VBS curriculum. There are also the potential outreach gifts such as donations to the local Mission or scholarships at Barrydowne College. The list should be revised annually and updated whenever a particular gift has been designated.
- f) The rector or members of the Memorial Committee meet with family members to discuss selection of memorial items. Once the item is chosen it will be purchased. If there is insufficient money for the item in the particular fund the family should be given the opportunity to come up with additional funds to fulfill their gift selection, or asked to choose an item of lesser value.
- g) If the item requires a plaque, this is ordered by the Memorial Committee in conjunction with the family. Appropriate wording is important.
- h) A date for the dedication of the item is arranged with family members and they are invited to church to attend the dedication service which happens during regular worship after the Prayers of the People. Following the service of dedication the family of the deceased should be thanked for their gift.
- i) The Sunday closest to All Saints Day is designated as Memorial Sunday when the names of the deceased are read out in church.
- j) Parishioners are given the opportunity to make regular memorial or thank offerings through the placing of flowers in the church.
- k) The Church of the Ascension Memorial Committee and leaders should consider inviting parishioners to consider legacy gifts. Don McLeod suggested the formation of an Endowment Fund.
- The Memorial Committee, in consultation with the rector of the parish and wardens, decides what to do with memorials that are worn or used beyond repair. Memorials that no longer reflect the purpose for which they were intended should be disposed of in a respectful manner. If the item is required it should be added to the list of memorials for replacement.
- 3) Church of the Ascension Memorial Committee members (2016) The incumbent The Ven. Anne Germond; Anne Trimmer, Gladys Abigail, Pippa Howard, Cora Felbel. Ralph Mounter is the Envelope Secretary and should be in on Memorial discussions, and so should the treasurer, Cathy Dionne.

A report from the Church of the Ascension Board to members of the congregation regarding the interim period in our parish.

Bless those who will lead us during the interim period, and keep us faithful to our calling to be united in love and fellowship as we seek to follow you. Guide with your heavenly wisdom the minds of those who will be responsible

for choosing a rector for this parish.

Send us a faithful pastor to feed your flock and lead us in the way of holiness; Through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen

At the November board meeting the members in attendance were given a number of questions which they answered in small groups. Each group brought their answers back to the table to share with the rest of the board.

The groups were asked to consider various options for the interim period (after Rev. Anne leaves in February and before a new rector is appointed) as well as to think about strengths of the Ascension and any concerns.

At the outset it was apparent that there is a very positive and hopeful feeling amongst the leadership and in the parish amongst members. The Ascension is a vibrant Christ centred parish and is well known in the community for its mission and ministry and it seeks to be a welcoming and hospitable parish, making room for newcomers and guests. There is a faithfulness amongst parishioners who want to serve Christ in the church and they give freely of their time, talents and treasure to make it so. Over the years we have grown and changed from being a neighbourhood church to one where people drive from across the city to attend. This says a lot about who we are as a parish.

The Ascension's involvement in city wide outreach will continue during the interim period and so will the weekly Wednesday services and Bible Study. The Wardens and Committee chairs will ensure that life in the parish continues - that the sick and lonely and bereaved are visited; that there are opportunities for fellowship and prayer; and that we remain a welcoming and hospitable congregation for those who are seeking a new church family.

Board members reflected back that this time could also be a growth period for the parish as new leaders come forward and are given opportunities to exercise their baptismal calling. The group also spoke of the spiritual well being of the parish during the interim period and that it is necessary to keep hope alive. Clergy come and go and it is up to parishioners to work together during interim periods to ensure the ongoing mission of the parish and to foster an ongoing sense of unity.

This is an exciting time too, as the Ascension considers its future and a future incumbent. In the coming months parishioners will be consulted about the qualities they would like to see in a new priest. While the work of the concurrence committee is a very confidential process and nothing can be disclosed to the congregation about potential candidates, the concurrence committee will be consulting with the parish on various aspects of the process.

There were some concerns that people might leave the parish and withdraw their offering, but it is the leadership's hope that this will not happen because of the work we have done together over the years and the strength of who we are in Christ. Some board members expressed concerns about there being a loss of momentum in the parish once Rev. Anne leaves, but others felt that with the committees being on solid ground and lead by the laity, that this would not happen. The board members are committed to continuing the regular pattern of weekday worship and study, fellowship and outreach.

Members spoke of the many new parishioners who have joined the parish in recent years from other denominations, from Anglican churches that have closed down, or from seekers who are looking to reignite their faith.

Finally, the board spoke of the necessity of ongoing and excellent communication throughout the interim period. People have offered to assist with this and Glenn Lloyd, the bulletin and Ascension Witness Editor has offered to continue in his role in communications. Board members are committed to guiding the parish through this time and are confident that amidst the concerns expressed that there is also a feeling of hope. Hope and expectations - pretty good Advent words!

In considering the interim period, the board would like to utilize the honourary clergy -Rev. Dr. Bob Derrenbacker, the Rev. Rhonda Hirst and the Rev. Jeff Hooper until the end of the summer of 2017. The honourary clergy have agreed to celebrate the Eucharist and preach on Sundays and when they are not available the lay readers would offer Morning Prayer and they would preach. We recognise that all three of our honouraries have full time ministries and would not necessarily be available for pastoral emergencies (although Rev. Rhonda is a Chaplain at HSN). We are very grateful for the assistance and commitment of the Honourary clergy. There would be a stipend for their ministry during the interim period. At the time of writing, a roster for Sunday mornings has been drawn up until June 2017.

The wardens and members of the board would like everyone to know that they will do their best to support the parish during the interim period. Be assured of our prayers. We move forward trusting in God who is faithful in all things.

Please pray for the parish as we begin a new period in our life together.

Communique to all ARK supporters and Church of the Ascension parishioners

November 1, 2016

We have been meeting, planning and receiving support from you for more than a year. It is a pleasure to tell you that we now feel optimistic that a Syrian family will arrive in Sudbury in early in 2017. The family we will welcome is headed by a young mother with four young children, two girls and two boys. They are excited about coming to Canada and look forward to the support of the Syrian families who have already been welcomed into Sudbury's caring community..

We are fortunate to have a house and some furniture available for the family. Thanks to generous Sudburians we will soon be asking for support to ready the house. We will also need your help to collect clean and appropriate clothing, foot wear and other personal and housing essentials. Those who expressed interest at our volunteer fair will soon be contacted and work plans put into action.

We are challenged by not knowing the exact arrival time of the family we will welcome. We do know that they have obtained medical clearances, and are in contact with the Canadian Embassy. With the help of a local volunteer translator we have a communication link to the mother and are learning more about her family. We hope to develop a relationship with her through phone calls before she arrives and to ascertain her travel plans as quickly as possible.

What is spiritual direction?

Directors ask questions about the relationship between the seeker and God. Who is God to the seeker? How and when is God made manifest in the seeker's life? How would the seeker describe him- or herself in relation to God? For example, is s/he a servant, a child, a friend, a co-worker, a co-creator, a lover, a neighbor, a spouse, a struggling adult? We know God only through our relationships with one another. How do these relationships affect the seeker's prayer life? life in the world? How does God become a felt presence?

Spiritual direction is not therapy but it can help us understand better who we are, specifically, personally, in a very real way. Though spiritual direction does not normally work with seekers who are in crisis or psychological distress—because that is not the training directors receive--it can increase feelings of trust, peace, and joy in everyday circumstances, for with sustained and careful attention to spiritual growth we can experience ever more deeply that we are following Christ.

Practically, a seeker might meet with a director approximately once a month for an hour. At Ascension, the meetings are free of charge, but elsewhere they may not be. Always, what transpires during the meeting remains confidential. The director maintains an interest in the seeker that is beyond curiosity about details of the seeker's life except as those details pertain closely to his or her relationship with God. Directors are advised not to ask what are called "curious questions" (e.g., where do you shop?). We are also instructed not to share our own stories in a way that might somehow inhibit the seeker from sharing hers or his. Yet a connection develops between director and seeker that is uniquely close and rewarding.

The director may ask about the seeker's prayer life or about manifestations of God's presence in his/her life since the last meeting. What struggles has the seeker experienced in gaining trust in God? Where in her or his life as a Christian has s/he found the greatest peace and joy? My own training in the Ontario Jubilee program (ontariojubilee.ca) advised us as directors simply to "take a long loving look at the real."

Spiritual direction complements the Christian tradition (or whatever the tradition of the director and seeker might be) and is not separate from or at odds with the tradition. Christian seekers have requested the guidance and advice of other seekers throughout the history of the church. Now--apart from seminaries or university courses in theology --formal training programs in Christian spiritual direction exist in North America and elsewhere in the English-speaking world. Those programs typically require group residencies that introduce trainees to such experiences of spiritual practice as journaling, walking labyrinths, and drawing or other creative work, and also reading and writing assignments supervised at a distance, often over a period of two years.

Upon completion of the training program, directors take part in regular peer supervision in which we discuss with one another as directors what in our own lives might interfere with our being—as much as possible—reflections of divine love to the seeker. We are also required, for as long as we practice spiritual direction, to honour and develop our own daily spiritual practices, to read about and reflect on spirituality, to make annual retreats, and to meet with a spiritual director My own index of spiritual growth is simple--Galatians 5:22-23, the Fruit of the Spirit (NSRV): "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." Why is the world the way it is?

WHEN WE ARE VERY young, we learn that things happen for causes—one kind of event seems to follow from another kind, and we can make what we want to happen and what we like to happen over and over again. People around us can make good things happen for us. And we can prevent what we do not like from happening.

Did you ever wonder...

Very early in our life we also discover that things are not as we want them to be. We are confronted by disappointing and unwanted events. We react angrily to these frustrating experiences and try to change them or get others to change them. Later, we see that many of the things that frustrate us are beyond our control. We begin to understand that some of these things are as they should be, while others could be otherwise, and are not as they should be.

In some way, Christians assert that everything that is comes from God, who has created the world, and is still creating, and all that God has created is good. As the Bible has it, "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed it was very good." And yet our experience that some things are not as they ought to be hauntingly remains for us. Was God shortsighted when he saw that the world was good?

God has created a host of natural objects—minerals, plants and animals—that behave in predictable ways. By means of these natural things everything that happens comes to pass. Human beings can understand these natural objects and have the ability to develop science and to understand good ways to behave. For the most part, human beings can understand and learn to predict the movements of natural objects. Sometimes they bring sudden and surprising consequences. The power of the force of gravity and the flow of the tides, for instance, are generally good. Yet the force of an earthquake, or a flood, or lightning or disease causes bad things to happen. When we understand these powers, we may be able to predict these catastrophes and minimize the bad consequences.

Human beings are created with the desire to be happy and to have friends. With a generous measure of freedom, we can consider and choose our actions in the light of our goals and desires. Sometimes these actions conflict with the good ways that the human race has identified. This conflict may be the result of unwise decisions, or selfish ones, or even evil ones, and the consequences, though not inevitable, come to pass. For instance, ill-considered or selfish actions may in the longer term have undesired consequences that destroy or mutilate nature. Actions based on selfish and wicked goals may bring wars or reduce some human beings to a state of degradation and deprivation, rather than friendship.

In all that happens, whether good or bad, we believe that God in Christ is with us and the same God that is creating this wonderful world is present with those who suffer and is bringing good out of evil. And God invites human beings to be part of that transformation.

- 1. Have you experienced the created world as good and benign or as evil and malevolent?
- 2. What evidence do you see that the world is not as it should be?
- 3. Do you know of ways in which you can contribute to and participate in the transformation of evil into good?
