From the Interim Rector...

How Do We Love Our Neighbors as Ourselves?

An Excerpt from Fr. Bob's Sermon from September 10, 2017

"Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law." (Romans 13:8-10)

This "law" of "loving your neighbor as yourself" is one that we see throughout the Bible. We first see it in Leviticus 19:18, way back in the Law of Moses. Then in the Gospels, Jesus also states that the entire Law is summed up in "loving your neighbor as yourself" (see Mark 12:28-34, paralleled in Matthew 22:34-40 and Luke 10:25-28). Specifically in Luke's Gospel, Jesus uses the parable of the Good Samaritan to illustrate what it means to love one's neighbor as oneself. Then in his letter, James states that one "fulfills the royal law" by loving your neighbor as yourself (James 2:8). And finally in Galatians 5:14, St. Paul says the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." So this "law" of loving your neighbor as yourself is both foundational and essential to Christian living. It is a requirement of all the faithful that can be traced throughout the entirety of the Scriptures.

But what does this mean for us living together in this Christian community we call the Church of the Ascension? How do we live out this command to love our neighbors as ourselves? I think there are five practical ways that we live out this type of love. You could certainly add more to this list, but let's start with five:

First, we will rejoice together when we need to rejoice, and we will mourn together

when we need to mourn. Jesus calls us to support each other in all times, whether times of joy or times of sorrow.

Second, we will offer forgiveness when asked, and we will ask for forgiveness when we have caused any offense or hurt. As we'll see next week in our Gospel reading, Jesus calls each of us to lead of life of forgiveness.

Third, we will choose to always be open to learning and being teachable. In loving our neighbors as ourselves, we are always ready to learn from others in our congregation, no matter their station in life, young or old, long-time parishioner or newcomer.

Fourth, we will not be judgmental of each other. Instead, we will ask the hard questions of ourselves.

And fifth, we will always pray for each other. A healthy Christian community is always rooted and grounded in prayer. On Sundays, our liturgy allows us to pray for each other and for this community. But a prayer-life rooted in love of neighbor needs to take place throughout the other six days of the week.

These are five simple but profound ways that we can do a better job loving our neighbors as ourselves right here at the Church of the Ascension.

School is starting to get back in full swing with classes beginning to fill students' coming days. Within the Parish, we are also gearing back up with the Board Meeting just this past week. Our church calendar is filling up with Parish events. The Weekly Announcements is filling up with news and events after the quiet summer season. As the meetings begin to fill our monthly planner, it seems a natural time to reflect on the various lively and vital ministries here at the Church of the Ascension.

The Church of the Ascension has always had the tradition of various active ministries, both those that were contained in the parish as well as many that overflowed into the community. Over the years, we have had some ministries sprout and grow beyond what we thought possible. Others peaked and have held steady, while a few have matured and quietly faded as the parish or community needs evolved, or those parishioners involved in planning were called to another ministry. But the parish is a living thing

and this sort of movement is natural.

Currently, we are incredibly blessed to continue the tradition of having many thriving ministries at the Church of the Ascension from Children and Youth Ministries, Worship Ministries, Music Ministries and Pastoral Care. This last one would be as simple as going to sit and visit with someone for an hour once a week. Our Outreach Ministry touches the Greater City of Sudbury through providing Out of the Cold Dinners, assisting Barrydowne College students with food and Christmas gifts. It also reaches across the globe to provide assistance to the Council of the North, the Tarime Diocese (Tanzania), and Zawadi la Tumaini (a Kenyan orphanage). Our Worship Ministry serves our community by providing monthly worship services to people in Finlandia and Westmount. So, our little Parish has both a near and far reaching scope, when it comes to serving others.

Some of these ministries have been around for a very long time and others are very new. One of those new ministries is a youth Bible Study. It started last September and is designed to serve to the needs of those children who are ready to launch from Godly Play and begin to study the Bible. Over this summer, our Worship Ministry also grew by adding more morning and evening prayer services. This shows that in our service to others there is always room for new ideas, suggestions and we are committed to continue to grow and evolve.

We have only touched on a few of the vital Ministries at our Parish. As James 2:26 states, "For just as a body without a spirit is dead, so also faith without works is dead." Faith flourishes when it includes Ministry or works. How do you feel called to serve? Talk to a few people around the Parish; find out what other Ministries are happening now. Is being involved in the worship service calling you? Assisting in home visits? How about joining an existing committee? If you have some ideas or thoughts on ways we can better serve our Parish or our community, speak to a church leader. Share your ideas. Fan the embers of your faith and let's live our lives to the fullest serving Christ as we serve each other:
